Biographical and Historical Note:

James Buchanan Henry, also known as Buck, was born on March 1, 1833. Just like his cousin, Harriet, Buck lost both of his parents and was taken in as James Buchanan's ward in 1840. During his early years, he attended several boarding schools and eventually graduated from the College of New Jersey. Though his interests remained with the arts, Buck went on to read law under an attorney named John Cadwalader. When James Buchanan assumed the presidency, he called for Buck to join him as his private secretary, a position known today as the Chief of Staff. While Buck worked at Washington, he found himself in frequent conflict with his Uncle. This conflict came to a head in 1858 when Buck proposed to his sweetheart, Mary Nicholson. Upset that Buck hadn't consulted him on the proposal, James Buchanan disapproved of the match. Buck left his position as private secretary and went on to marry Miss Nicholson. The couple would have two children, one of whom would survive into adulthood.

Soon after the birth of their second child, Mary Nicholson died of consumption, leaving Buck a widower. Later on, he married Louisa Anderson, and the two had six sons. After fourteen years of marriage, Louisa died. Buck would marry for a third time much later in his life to a woman named Margaret Grote Elliman. Buck was 71 and Margaret was 24. The two had no children and enjoyed 11 years of marriage before Buck died on February 17, 1915. [https://www.lancasterhistory.org/about-wheatland/, accessed 10/24/2019]

Folder 1 Washington, D.C., 12 February 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to H. B. Swarr enclosing copies of the President's Kansas message to be distributed to prominent Democrats, with more to follow, wishing that Col. Stambaugh know that James Buchanan Henry sent them, and emphasizing the importance of the material as the county convention is upon them.

Folder 2 Washington, D.C., 18 May 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson detailing his experience on the Russian super ship named for Grand Duke Constantine and hoping their last walk together was not too tiring for her. Envelope with stamp and postmark of Jersey City addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, c/o Major Hagner USA, Frankford Arsenal, Bridesburg, Philadelphia.

Folder 3 Washington, D.C., 20 June 1858

Note from J. B. Henry to H. B. Swarr asking on behalf of the President if he knows "anything of the Parties mentioned in the enclosed communication from the Navy Department." Communication not with note.

Folder 4 Washington, D.C., 25 June 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson commenting on the heat wave; hoping that she is not too tired after reading his lengthy letter; his boredom at having to chaperone his cousin, Miss S, even after trying to expound of the merits of General Ward as a love interest; and wonders why he has lost interest in everyone else but her; commenting on the praise Scharff heaped upon her; and hoping to persuade her mother to allow her to write more often. Envelope with postmark and stamp removed and intact red wax seal addressed to Miss M. H. Nicholson, Care of Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 5 Washington, D.C., 26 June 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson worrying that she is not fully truthful with him concerning her health, according to Leila; enclosing a telegram from Fam. Pleasants expressing his enthusiasm about the performance of a new boat, *La Sovrana*, which he hopes will be in Annapolis soon, an event with which Scharff agrees; and misses her so much he can hardly contain himself. Envelope with postmark, stamp, and intact gold-speckled red wax seal addressed to Miss Mary Nicholson, Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 6 Washington, D.C., 7 July 1858

Note from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson reporting that the President has reviewed the gentlemanly- and gallant-looking 600-700 strong 7th New York Regiment, arriving by steamer to accompany the remains of former President James Monroe to Richmond and that they will leave on an excursion on Tuesday morning early. Envelope with postmark, stamp, and floral emboss addressed to Miss M. H. Nicholson Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.



Folder 7 Washington, D.C., Soldiers' Home, 11 July 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson apologizing for not writing on schedule but while they are in the country the regular schedule will not work since the President leaves the While House on Friday for the weekend; he is arranging a Party for a sail on the *Harriet Lane* that he will have no time to write; he hopes the trip will include Annapolis so that he might bring is best friend Mr. Scharff, who has kept him from becoming too wild, to meet her and implores her to like him; General Ward is joining the group in hopes that Miss Saunders will also be there, but she will not be; mentions her cousin Margie, the Ingrahams, and her aunt; chatted with Miss Emily. Envelope addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 8 Washington, D.C., 21 July 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson expressing gratitude for a five-day interlude in his less than happy position as personal secretary to the President and is "disconsolate" after Mr. Scharff's leaving on the *Harriet Lane*; provides intimate details of a conversations with Mr. Scharff about their opening a law office together in New York after his upcoming marriage and that all four will be happy together living in adjoining houses in a pleasant little town near Manhattan; renders an account of his entire life including the death of his parents, his college experiences, his passing the bar in Philadelphia and setting up a thriving office there before being called by the President to be his personal secretary, a post he hopes to vacate as soon as possible to return to law practice; and his relative freedom while James Buchanan and Harriet Lane go to Bedford for a retreat, leaving him free to visit Mary on the weekends. Envelope with most of the postmark removed with the stamps and addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland; also a blank invitation card of the President's.

Folder 9 Washington, D.C., 22 July 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson expressing regret that her latest letter was temporarily lost in the mail but it arrived safely; looking forward to September 1859; and his enjoying a joke at Mr. Scharff's expense. Envelope with postmark removed along with stamp addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 10 Washington, D.C., Tuesday [3 August 1858]

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson informing her that he arrived from his visit with her in good time, but that he hasn't felt well since returning; recalls his pleasant walk with her; announcing that the President will return to Washington at the end of the week; talked with Captain Ingraham about his daughters will return today in the company of Major Hagner; relating that Mr. Schraff's fiancée is ill; and the expected cable from Queen Victoria proclaiming the opening of the transatlantic cable has not yet arrived. nvelope with postmark partially obscured addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 11 Washington, D.C., 18 August 1858



Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson saying he is back at work as usual; apparently Miss Cass will marry Mr. Van Limburg; Mr. Scharff's fiancée is reluctant to set a date for their marriage; he will be going "to exercise & recruit" in the Lake George area to be able to face the "winter's labor & dissipation" but will visit her on his way north but if he cannot stop on his way, he will miss seeing the Ingraham sisters. Envelope with postmark and stamp addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 12 Caldwell, Lake George, NY, 25 August 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson relating his lengthy trip from Annapolis to Baltimore (where he would have visited her dear Margie if he had had a letter of introduction, to Philadelphia, to Newark (where Mr. Scharff joined him and had a pleasant chat and a bite to eat in New York) to New York (where he met Barton Key and Mr. Banks), by boat up the river to Albany and disembarking at Saratoga Moreau to finish the trip by carriage; recalls the many people that have come and gone since he started visiting Lake George and wishes she could be there with him; instead of going to Bolton via public transportation, Mr. Davids will take him on his yacht. Envelope with stamp removed and engraving of the Lake House, Caldwell, Lake George, NY, on back addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care of Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 13 Bolton, Lake George, NY, 28 August 1858

Letter No. 2 from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson looking forward to receiving her letters; recounting his taking the steamer instead of the yacht because of the weather; meeting old college and other friends; taking an excursion to Lake Saranac and Lake Champlain; feeling much stronger physically in the fresh air; blaming the laziness of the postmaster at Caldwell for not putting her letter to him on the steamer; signing the letter the less formal James Buchanan Henry. Envelope from Bolton, NY August 28 with stamp addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 14 Bolton, Lake George, NY, [1 September 1858]

Letter No. 3 from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson happy to have received her last letter and praising her sweetness and beauty while modestly acknowledging his faults; lamenting the fact that he never had a sister (she died at age 2) brought on by the visit of the Ingrahams; the atmosphere of Lake George must be felt in person, and implores her to use the pronoun "our" instead of "your" when referring to the place; that his steamboat would be right at home here; and lamenting that none of his own family has written. Envelope from Bolton, NY September 1 with stamp addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 15 Bolton, Lake George, NY, 1 September 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson commenting on the "fairy" setting around him; after taking a nap he and his friend jumped into the water to simulate falling from a capsized boat and later that day his sail boat capsized, giving him a second dunking with a resulting cold and sore throat; comments on the artists' colony and the Thieriot family of New Jersey; Mr. Brewster and Dr. Porter are getting along very well; compares unfavorably the British celebration to the success of the transatlantic cable to



the one held in New York; pleads for more letters from her. Envelope from Bolton, NY September 1 with stamp addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland. In another hand: October 1st, My treasure.

Folder 16 Bolton, Lake George, NY, 6 September 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson describing the difficulty in traveling from Bolton to Caldwell to retrieve her letter from the post office, and the resulting horrific time with a sailboat and a rowboat; describes in flowery detail the sunset; plans to start home in about a week; warns her of the dangers of horseback riding but "does not object"; did not see Mr. Schraff's fiancée because she went to Chicago; promises not to commit an unnamed faux pas again; asks to be remembered to her mother and Miss Margie. Envelope from Bolton, NY September 6 with stamp removed addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 17 Bolton, Lake George, NY, 8 September 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson commenting that he likes the wind blowing from the south because it first blew over Annapolis; hopes he will see her in a little over a week; Mr. Schraff's fiancée's being in Chicago because of poor health has postponed their wedding; feels revitalized and tanned on face and hands; misses Mr. Brewster since his return to New Jersey; launches a lengthy discussion on how important religion will be in their married life and how much he dislikes the life in Washington; asks to be remembered to her mother and family. Envelope from Bolton, NY September 6 with stamp addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 18 Bolton, Lake George, NY, 10 September 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson regretting that he must limit his correspondence because of a shortage of paper in Bolton; recalls her wearing a lily of the Nile in her hair and calls her "My own sweet lily of the Severn"; vows to walk to Caldwell to get her next letter if it is not on the steamboat; wishes for a less formal signature. Envelope from Bolton, NY September 10 with stamp addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 19 Bolton, Lake George, NY, 12 September 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson wondering why her last letter had a sad ring to it; does not want to return to the "hateful climate of Washington"; is happy that her sister Emily is coming to Lake George as part of her wedding trip but is sad he will not be there show her its beauty; the family Thieriot is prepared to love her when they meet her; gives his travel itinerary, stopping in New York to see Mr. Scharff and attend to business, stopping to see Edward Young Buchanan, whose family nursed him back to health when he was sick, and finally arriving in Annapolis for the weekend; tried to paint her a picture of Lake George, but has not painted recently. Envelope from Bolton, NY September 10 with stamp partially removed addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 20 Washington, D.C., 27 September 1858



Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson expressing surprise and delight at receiving her "extra" letter which he received a day late because the President and his party were still in the country and he is happy that her mother guards her well; reports that talking to her mother was gratifying especially since Mary's grandmother was feeling better; the president of the Austrian ministry would like to present an autographed letter to the President in person; met her Uncle Peter and his wife this morning; has not seen Dan or the girls but will soon; will move back to the city very soon; his friend Schraff appears to have shaken the blues over a love affair; hopes she will be well enough to visit him soon. Envelope with stamp and postmark addressed to Miss M. H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 21 Washington, D.C., 19 October 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson hoping she is well and recalling with joy their last walk along the bay as the "broad streak" of the moon appeared; the motor for his yacht *Savana* will arrive and Ben will install it so that he and Mary can go sailing; Bob Magraw is coming for the weekend; is looking forward to seeing her again; Miss Lane is christening the "new sloop of war" *Lancaster* at the request of Commander Stewart; Baron Sacker and the aide-de-camp to Grand Duke Constantine, Baron Bori, will be visiting Annapolis soon; and offers to send her a bouquet if she decides to go to a ball. Envelope with stamp removed and postmark addressed to Miss M. H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 22 Washington, D.C., 22 October 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson trying to get over a "large dinner"; looking forward to next week when he hopes to bring his yacht to Annapolis for a sail to Baltimore and back if he gets the weekend off and the weather is fine; the President granted a short reprieve to Barret, who should have been hanged today; wonders of Miss Emily's sore throat is better; hopes she will be able to accompany Miss Ella to Washington so that he and she can see each other every night and would be her first visit to the capital since their engagement; Mr. Magraw came from Baltimore to have dinner with him and hopes Magraw and a "sparkling young widow" will soon make a match; has received an invitation to General Henderson's daughter's wedding, the groom, Mr. du Pont, is a good friend of his.

Folder 23 Washington, D.C., 25 October 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson expressing his great joy that in four days she will be in Washington; spent some time with Captain Ingraham and Miss Leila, who told him of the impending visit of Mary and her mother that, alas, will end all to soon; the town is dull even with the coming of the opera, in which he has little interest; hopes the ball she is attending is delightful; and will send her some lilies of the valley by express. Envelope with stamp removed and postmark addressed to Miss M. H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 24 Washington, D.C., 15 November 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson expressing deep concern that his boat has been damaged or lost and feels guilt that three lives might be lost because



they worked for him; first snow of the season is falling; accompanied Miss Emily Ingraham home from Dr. Ryner's church; and her father is ill after returning from his northern tour. Envelope with stamp and postmark addressed to Miss M. H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 25 Washington, D.C., 10 November 1858

Note on back of James Buchanan Henry's calling card to Mary Hagner Nicholson expressing regrets that he cannot see her today but will definitely see her tomorrow. Envelope with stamp and postmark addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 26 Washington, D.C., 30 November 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson expecting to hear in her next letter than her mother and the rest of the family are well; will send her a book of sermons he found enlightening; encloses a "funny" telegram from Mr. Scharff expressing concern that their boat and James Buchanan Henry were lost in a storm, based on a newspaper article; played a game of chess with Mr. Appleton and was beaten but hopes she will learn the game so that they can have "lovers" games with long times between moves; and has seen nothing of her grandmother's family since his last letter. Envelope with stamp removed and postmark addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 27 Washington, D.C., [2 October] 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson saying he has been too busy to write or to see her mother; Miss Emily has returned to Annapolis; had hoped that the President would no return to the city so soon, but since the weather has cooled, perhaps she can visit; pities her mother with her dental problems; mentions the comet appearing over the bay; Miss Macalester has gone; Miss Ida Seimres is marrying a "strong Catholic"; the Van Limburgs have taken a house on 7th Street; will see her mother soon and hopes to resume more frequent writing. 2 envelopes with stamp and postmark addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 28 Washington, D.C., 6 December 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson relating the current business of getting the President's message and Cabinet reports to Congress; delighted that he will visit her in a week; will go to a party at the Ingrahams and Mr. Magraw is staying with him; hopes to attend another concert; Mr. Scharff has not written; and James Buchanan Henry has been too busy to visit her father. Envelope with stamp removed and postmark addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 29 Washington, D.C., 17 December 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson commenting on the warm weather; the Napiers have been recalled to The Hague; all the young ladies are chasing Lord Lyons, a bachelor; the "gaity' season has begun, with many dinners; Mr. Scharff's



brother and his bride (they were engaged three years!) are sightseeing; Mrs. Craig asked about her; asks about her "little hospital patients" thanks Miss Emily for her postscript to Mary's last letter. Envelope with stamp removed and postmark addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 30 Washington, D.C., 18 December 1858

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson apologizing for feeling so bad because of the long state dinners he must attend and hopes they will end soon; saw Mr.& Mrs. Scharff and took them to the Capitol; writes in such a condition only to let her know that he is thinking of her. Envelope with stamp removed and postmark addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 31 Washington, D.C., [1858]

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson saying he is back to normal and at work again; hopes the season will start soon because it will be his last in Washington; will cherish the fever blister he got while visiting her; James Buchanan returned from Wheatland with Bob Magraw, who will remain for a few days; saw the two Macalasters; saw Captain Ingraham for a few minutes; and looks for her next welcome letter. Envelope with stamp and postmark addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson, Care Col. Nicholson, Annapolis, Maryland.

Folder 32 Washington, D.C., [17 August 1858]

Note from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson regretting that he could not meet her at the station but he had to attend a state dinner and will drop by later. Envelope with no postmark and no stamp addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson at Dr. Hagner, Washington.

Folder 33 [Washington, D.C., 6 June 1858 or 1859]

Note from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson commenting on the nice morning and saying he has sent a copy of *Last of the Mohicans* along with a "little floral message"; that he accompanied Miss Bright to church; and that he will see her later that day. Envelope with seal addressed to Miss Nicholson. June 6 written in pencil on face of envelope.

Folder 34 [Washington, D.C., 1858 or 1859]

Note from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson stating that he has to go with the President and the Cabinet to the Capitol for signing of a number of bills and he has to announce them as fast as they are signed; therefore he will not be able to go with her unless the bills move faster than he thinks; and that her father is better. Envelope with no postmark and no stamp addressed to Miss Mary H. Nicholson at Dr. Hagner, Washington.

Folder 35 Washington, D.C., No date

Letter from J. B. Henry to Mary Hagner Nicholson saying delayed going to Captain Ingraham's to await her letter, but it did not come; the delay in the mails resulting an
