My dear Sir,

I enclose you a receipt for the Globe. I wish I had the time to give your letter such an answer as it deserves. There have been no Congressional documents as yet published for distribution: and I feel confident I do not exaggerate when I say that it not possible for me to supply one in ten of my friends with the documents they desire. If complaints should be made of neglect, I shall rely upon you to make my apology.

The Session thus far has been very dull & promises to continue so. It may be enlivened a little in the House to day by the Impeachment which Botts has given notice that he intends to move against the President. This is all a humbug & will end in smoke.

This day will most probably decide my fate at Harrisburg & I am prepared for any event. It seems that nothing will satisfy my enemies, not one of whom has the slightest cause to be such, but my destruction. My only sin is that I have been brought forward in the Presidency by a large portion of the Democracy of my native State, although I myself have not raised a finger or stirred a step in the matter.
