My dear Harriet,

I have just rec'd your note of yesterday.

I gave a dinner to day to Rev Johnston, Captain Strobling & some American friends.- I dined yesterday at Sir William Ousley's. Mr. McGregor & myself were the only company. I am to dine at Lady Talbot's on Thursday next.

You ought to make out your visit at Paris, as you will not see it again previous to your return to the U.S.

I intend to employ Mr. Moran out of my own pocket after the 1<sup>st</sup> November next. I must have a laborious man like him who will make it his sole business to do his duty. With him & Col: Lawrence I can get along very well.

It is Mr. Welsh's interest to go home after his return from Paris.

It is my earnest wish that he should do so: & I hope he will do it.

I must have a spare room in the house for strangers. Besides, there may have been something in the caution of Dr. Binny.

He promised he would go home & that too on his excellent father's suggestion after visiting the continent; & I promised him that his salary should continue during this visit.

I am a little astonished at your remark, when you so fully know my feelings, that, "he would think it unkind to propose leaving out of respect to me."
