Washington 11 June 1848

My dear Sir /

I sent to Mr. Kuntz, the Prothonotary, on the 5th. Instant an agreement signed by Col: Stambaugh to revive my judgment against him of June Term 1843 no 78 to which I have received no answer. The five years will be out on Tuesday next: & I would thank you to attend to this matter for me. The Colonel is now in Lancaster & will willingly confess judgment. In any event I would thank you not to let me lose my lien.

At your meeting I should be very sorry if any question would arise relative to myself. It would be disagreeable to me & might prove injurious to General Cass. <u>I</u> specially request that my name may not be introduced in any resolution if it will encounter opposition. Should Frazer or any of his set make the attack, I shall rely on my friends to defend me. I believe that at no former period were my friends throughout the State more decided in their attachment. The course of the State administration against the Pennsylvania Candidate has contributed to produce this result.

The Whig friends of Taylor here speak of Pennsylvania as one of his certain States. I trust & believe they will be disappointed.
