I am glad dear Dody is getting on well & hope he does not give your Mother too much trouble – please make him practice his music <u>regularly</u> & my dear wife I want you to use your legitimate <u>authority</u> with him. <u>Authority</u> when mangled with <u>gentleness</u> & <u>interest</u> will soon win his regard & affection for all time I hope.
