We enclose Judgment Note vs. Jacob P. Angney dated Philada, August 24, 1877 for \$607. 69/100. We are informed that Angney is doing business at Columbia, Pa. in his own name; and "if so" he ought to pay our claim: --

A petition in Bankruptcy was filed vs Angney in Octr 1877 – but the Creditors who signed the same did not succeed in having him declared a Bankrupt; and his store goods were sold by the Sheriff of Franklin County – (he did business at Chambersburg) and we believe the Judgment Creditors were not fully paid; The first thing to do, is to ascertain, whether Mr. Angney is doing business in his own name, and if so, they "proceed at once, if the Judgt. were entered, at once, he might transfer his property; or Confess Judgment and cut us off. Use your discretion and do as you may deem proper; we know that other creditors, who have no Judgments, will proceed to secure Judgment – this would of course alarm him – and, he will no doubt endeavor to escape paying his debts. He is perhaps already fortified; but still he may be caught napping, & our claim may be paid.
