## Senate Chamber 1 July 1840

## Dear Sir/

If it were possible, I would greatly prefer that the democracy of Pittsburg [sic] might be consulted by you in selecting as successor for Major Lynch. Your determination, however, to make the nomination tomorrow renders this impossible; and compliance with your request <sup>made to</sup> <sup>Dr. Sturgeon and myself.</sup> I feel no hesitation in suggesting the name of <sup>all the circumstances in recommending the appointment of Major K. Moorhead of Pittsburg as a suitable person to be appointed Postmaster. I know that he would have been most extensively & powerfully recommended for the appointment, had he not determined that he would not <sup>been unwilling to</sup> interfere with the reappointment of Major Lynch; and if time could now be afforded, I believe he could present the strongest claims before you. I know that Governor Porter is to my knowledge <sup>who knows him well has great confidence in him & is</sup> his warm & devoted friend; & in my opinion, he is a gentleman in every respect well qualified to discharge the duties of the office; whilst, at the same time, he is an active, decided, & influential politician. In the absence of all information from the democracy of Pittsburg on the subject, I think, that under the circumstances Major Moorhead would be the most judicious selection.</sup>
