# **Transcription:**

## Evening

We are to start from here early tomorrow morning Col. Fisher, Lieu<sup>t</sup>. Evans, Dr. Rohrer, and Henry Mullen dined with me to day. The Penn<sup>a</sup> Reserves pass'd through this afternoon. I am still very well. I would love dearly to see you. I am thinking so much about my dear children that I am getting homesick. I do hope something will transpire soon that will enable me to get home, if only for a few hours.

Do not [let] Blant forget me— I suppose there is no danger of Lillie – Effie – Mazie and yourself forgetting Papa. During the Battle of South Mountain I captured a Rebel Soldier. he asked implored me not to hurt him. I asked him if he had a family at home he said yes. He had a wife and five little children in Georgia— I told him then he was just like me that I would protect him, and I did. I thought of my own dear home and felt for him.

I must stop. good night. Your affectionate Papa Thos Welsh

Letter includes thoughts about his family; fear of being forgotten by his kids; story of capturing a Rebel soldier at South Mountain and how he identified with that soldier having a similar family situation.
