The bride's costume was white satin, heavily trimmed with point lace, tulle veil, with wreath of orange blossoms and diamond ornaments. Among the jewels was a lace pin in imitation of an officer's full dress sword with a large diamond in the hilt. Miss Powles wore a dress of canary satin and gold plush, with brocaded velvet front and trimmed with Escorial lace and white ostrich plumes, with diamond ornaments. Miss Lena Powles wore pink surah and lace. Miss Madge Millard, of Albany, black silk on train. Mrs. Nichols, of Newark, ashes of roses sild en train and diamonds.
