

Lancaster, 15th Sept. 1782.

Dear Sir,

Inclosed you have a Return of the Regiment. The nine Men mentioned in the last Return Furlough expired were chiefly disabled Men; and as any further Service was not expected from them, I find they were told by their Officers, when they went on Furlough, that if their Healths did not permit their returning at the Time prescribed, no Advantage would be taken of it; indeed, some of their Furloughs were to the best of my Remembrance conditional. Since last Return one has joined the Regiment; one we have Advice of being Sick at Baltimore; and one we hear is near the Head of Elk;—six are returned on Furlough, who are the aged, wounded and infirm, which certainly are intitled to the Pension of the Public under a Resolution of Congress made and provided for them, who will be recommended to his Excellency the Commander in Chief for that Purpose. These Explanations I think may be necessary for your Information; if however

you think it best they should be struck off the
Returns, advise me of it and it shall be done.
