Call For A Civic Congress

The idea of a Civic Congress of Negroes in Lancaster. Pa., originated in the mind of Rev. F. T. M. Webster, pastor o fthe Bethel A. M. E. Church. This Reverend Doctor, with his hand always on the pulse of the times. with a mind quick to observe and keen of perception, with a large fund of experience upon which to base his reasonings, called a couple of friends, Messrs. H. H. Brown and Charles S. Beaubain, to his Lancaster study one evening and then and there apprised them of his desire to wake up the Negroes of Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. He said that it could best be done through the convening of a Civic Congress, at which the most able speakers available should be secured to advise the Race in this section of the State of its needs. He also mapped out a plan of securing delegates to this congress, which was later followed strictly according to his advice.

The result of this first evening's conference was that a few days later some five or six more gentlemen were interested, and at a meeting in the home of Mr. Charles S. Beaubain, a temporary organization was effected. The following Sunday, September 9, 1917, a general meeting was held in Bethel A. M. E. Church, with an attendance of about one hundred, a permanent organization established, a call ordered sent to "all Negro Churches, Fraternal Orders and all other Negro organizations of approved good purposes, each of the same to send two delegates" (from the minutes) and the dates for the Civic Congress set at October 17-18, 1917. This meeting was a great success. Another Congress is now called to meet in the Court House at Lancaster, October 3 and 4. All organizations in the interest of the Negroes in Lancaster County are entitled to representation.

A Short Sketch of His Life from Encylopaedia of African Methodism

Rev. F. T. M. Webster, son of Andrew and Harriet Webster, both members of the M. E. Church, was born May 1, 1853, in Montgomery County, Md. He was one of sixteen children. He entered school in 1865 and attended in all eight years, completing his education at the Theological Seminary, Philadelphia. He received the degree of D.D. from Morris Brown College. He was converted January, 1880, and joined Macedonia A. M. E. Church, Camden, N. J., the same year. He has been class leader and Sunday school teacher. He was licensed to preach June, 1881, at Macedonia, Camden, N. J., by Rev. Samuel B. Williams. He joined the Annual Conference in April, 1885, at Burlington, N. J., under Bishop Cain. He was ordained deacon in 1887, at Trenton, N. J., by Bishop A. W. Wayman, and ordained elder in 1889 at Mt. Holly, N. J., by Bishop H. M. Turtner. He has held the following apointments: Heightstown Circuit, 1885-86; Rock Hill, 1887-77; Flemington, N. J., 1889; Fair Haven, N. J., 1889-90; Burlington, 1890-91; P. E. New England Conference, 1891-92; Greenwich, Conn., 1893; Mt. Pisgah, Philadelphia, 1894-98; Mt. Olive, 1898-1904; Zion Chapel, Philadelphia, 1905; P. E. West Philadelphia District, 1905-10; Mt. Pisgah, Philadelphia, 1911; York, 1912; Zion, 1913-14 P. E. Harrisburg District, 1914 to 1916; pastor Lancaster, Pa., since June, 1916.

He built a church at Bound Brook, \$1,000, in 1898. He lifted the mortgage on Heightstown to the amount of \$300 in 1886; at Flemington, N. J., he bought a lot to the amount of \$250 in 1889; built parsonage at Fair Haven to the amount of \$2,000 in 1890; remodeled at Burlington

to the amount of \$780 in 1891; paid \$2,500 at Mt. Pisgah; paid \$5,100 on Mt. Olive. He has taken about 2,619 persons into the church, baptized 350 people and married 215 persons. He has been delegate to the General Conferences of 1904-08-12-16. He was a member of the Missionary Board, 1904-8. He married Miss Ella E. Holland, of Lewes, Del., September 22, 1878. He has contributed to the A. M. E. Review. He is a member of F. and A. M. He was a master of the Subordinate Lodge ten years, P. G. M. of the State of New Jersey, High Priest, Most Eminent Grand Commander, Crown Prince of the Royal Secret, and a member of the Supreme Council of the 33rd and last degree, and present Deputy of the Valley of New Jersey, and Grand Treasurer of the State of New Jersey. He is a member of the Republican party. He owns a home. He is actively associated with the prisons and charitable work in general, and a leader among the people. His wife died October 1, 1916.



HISTORICAL AND STATISTICAL DATA

Furnished by Dr. R. R. Wright, Jr., Author "The Negro in Pennsylvania

1501-Negroes first in America.

1635—Negroes first mentioned in Pennsylvania.

1682-William Penn comes to Pennsylvania.

1791-First record of Negro owning property in Penna.

1688—First protest against slavery in Pennsylvania by Germantown Friends.

1770—March 3—Crispus Attucks, a Negro, and three whites spill first blood for American independence—The Boston Massacre.

1776—Abolition Society started in Pennsylvania—Benjamin Franklin, President.

1780-Slavery abolished in Pennsylvania.

1786—"Underground Railroal" in Pennsylvania for escape of slaves.

1787—Richard Allen founded Bethel A. M. E. Church, and Absalom Jones begins the organization of St. Thomas' P. E. Church, Philadelphia.

1816—African Methodist Episcopal Church started in Philadelphia.

1838-Negroes disfranchised in Pennsylvania.

1857—Suffrage restored.

Distinguished Pennsylvanians

Bishop Richard Allen, born 1760, first bishop of the A. M. E. Church. Other bishops born in Pennsylvania were: William Paul Quinn, T. M. D. Ward, Benjamin Arnett, J. H Armstrong, J. W. Hood.

James Durham, the first Negro physician, was a Pennsylvanian.

Robert Purvis and William Still were active in the Underground Railway.

Francis E. W. Harper was a popular poet.

One Negro, Harry W. Bass, has been a member of the Pennsylvania Legislature.

One, Leroy Locke, represented Pennsylvania as Rhodes scholar in Oxford University, England.

One(R. R. Wright, Jr., has been Research Fellow in the University of Pennsylvania.

Three Negroes have been awarded the Ph.D. degree from the University of Pennsylvania; Pezavia O'Connell, 1896; Lewis Moore, 1898; and R. R. Wright, Jr., 1911.

There were five Negroes out of every 100 who could read and write in 1860; to-day there are 75. Negroes owned less than two million dollars worth of property in 1860; to-day they own a BILLION DOLLARS WORTH.
