To the Members of the Board of Directors:
This year your Recreation Association is planning two reports. The following report, which is statistical, is for the members of our Board. This report covers the activities, registrations and costs of the past year.

The second report will be a descriptive report of the work of our Association and will be presented after we are established in the new headquarters of the Grubb Mansion on Lime Street, which is now under construction. This report will also be sent to our community friends.

The new building, besides being the headquarters of the Recreation Association, with a portion of the building devoted to the city's use, will take the place of the old Craft Shop where Boys' and Girls' Clubs were held for many years. The new quarters will make possible more than double the activities of the old Craft Shop.

The staff of the Recreation Association realizes with each succeeding year that in spite of the large number of recreation programs held and the great number of individuals in each program, that the final success of its work is what happens to the individual in these groups. While we re-create in masses, we change to better and more satisfying forms of recreation as an individual.

Recreati on groups have a place for the star, but they are
possibly more concerned with the novice - the beginner. For it is with the novice that the instructor is able to expose his personality which inspires the pupil to more proficient performance and greater satisfaction in his work. Real satisfaction, for example, either in a craft program or an athletic activity comes as skill in performance develops. The successful leader must give of his talent and of himself generously if this aim is to be accomplished.

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5 Playgrounds were open for a pre season program from May 14 to June 22, from 6:00 to dark. The 14 playgrounds opened for the summer schedule June 25 to September 1.

SUPERVISORS ' INSTITUTE - This training period was held one week before the opening of the playgrounds. Instruction was given in handicraft, dramatics, folk dancing, leagues and tournaments, story-telling, music, first aid and counsel on many forms of activities.

HIKING CLUB - The Hiking Club, wi th a membership of 120 men and women held weekly hikes during the entire year.

FREE SWIMMING LESSONS - 400 children were registered for the lessons, which have been sponsored by the Maple Grove Pool, the Lancaster New Era, and our Association for the past 20 years. 120 children successfully passed the swimming test and received certificates.

## DAILY PLAYGROUND ACTIVITIES

Daily activities on the playgrounds included - Storytelling, Festivals, Treasure Hunts, Baby Shows, Fashion Shows, Doll Shows, Dog Shows, Scavenger Hunts, Pet Shows, Soap Bubble Contests, Handicraft Shows, Hobby Shows, and many other such programs were held daily, including baseball, volleyball, paddle tennis, quoits, and other athletic games.

BOYS : SOFTBALL - 10 Junior and 10 Senior Teams played a total of 80 games with 250 boys participating.

SOFTBALL ACCURACY CONTEST - 140 boys on 9 playgrounds participated. The 9 winners met at Edward Hand Playground to decide the city champion.

TENNIS TOURNAMENT - 92 boys and girls were entered in our 3-day Tournament held at Buchanan Park and
F. \& M. Courts. The winners were awarded trophies and a year's membership to the Lancaster Tennis Club.

FARNUM RECREATI ON SOFTBALL LEAGUE - 90 men participated in this Class A League. The winner of the League went to the finals of the State Softball Championships. CITY-WIDE PAGEANT - A Pageant, "Johnny Stranger Sees the U.S.A." was held at Buchanan Park with 140 children participating.

HANDICRAFT DISPLAY - A daily handicraft period of sewing, painting, weaving, etc. was given on all the playgrounds during the summer, and a display of some 200 crafts made by the children was presented in a downtown show window at the end of the season.

JOSEPH LEE DAY - This is the Annual Play Day for the entire city a summer highlight - and an afternoon of play for play's sake, followed by light refreshments.
GIRLS' VOLLEYBALL - 80 girls participated in the Volleyball League.
CITY-WIDE DOLL SHOW - Many hundreds of dolls were on display during DJll Show week, and 78 dolls were taken by the children to the final Contest at 6th Ward Park.
PICNIC KITS Our 4 picnickits were in constant use during the summer, available to all interested groups, free.

The activities in the clubs were handicraft, including woodcraft made with motor tools, gym activities, table games, dancing, dramatics and special events such as Hallowe'en Parties, Christmas Parties, Valentine, St. Patrick's, etc.

## ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

A community Agency, of necessity, must depend on help from many sources.

Our National Association is always ready with inspiration and advice.

The Mayor and City Council furnish our Association with office space and the sum of $\$ 5,800.00$ to pay supervision on the 6 City Parks for ten weeks and for Wading Pools and St. Showers.

The Lancaster School Board gave us the use of 4 grade schools and two junior high schools for the winter program, 7 school grounds for summer playgrounds and the sum of $\$ 2,785.00$ paid for supervision on the school grounds.
