This God is our God, forever & ever;  
he will be our ~~guide~~<sup>guide</sup> even unto death

I God is our God, because he  
has chosen us to be his people.

Before we had a being we were  
his. When we were dead &c he lov-  
us accord. to the riches of his mer-  
cy. When we knew him not, & nev-  
er thought of him, he call. us to re-  
ceive the fulness of his grace. This is  
the great reason for our gratitude &c.  
that he waited not for merit in us;  
but from the overflowing of his own  
compass. towards us, he had mercy on  
us, because he would have mercy.

The apostle often speaks of this subj.  
with thanksgiving unto God.

Writing to the Ephes. he &c "Bless. be  
the God & Father &c who hath bless. us

with all spirit bless. in heavenly &c.  
accord. as he hath chosen us in him  
before the foundation &c. that we shd  
be holy & without blame before him  
in love." And to the Thess. &c. "We give  
thanks to God always for you all, mak-  
mension of you in our prayers; re-  
membering without ceasing, your  
work of faith &c in our S. J. C. in the  
sight of God & our Father; knowing, breth-  
ren beloved, your election of God." &c.  
By his own unbound. love, he hath thus  
become our God; & we feel constrain.  
to give him all the glory, for that free  
grace, ~~which~~ has sav. us from ever-  
lasting ruin, & given <sup>unto us</sup> great & precious  
promises in C. I. without any refer.  
to merit, or worthiness of our own.

II God the Saviour is our God, by a  
voluntary gift of himself for us.

When we were helpless & hopeless,  
without strength, in due time C. died

for the ungodly"

Sin had destroyed the whole race; & place them under the wrath & curse &c &c.  
The wrath of G. was reveal. &c.  
Without shed. of blood &c.

Either the sinner or a substitute must die, to preserve the Majesty of God, unstain'd, & to reconcile the Justice of God to the pardon of the guilty. To make the necessary atone. for sin, & to accomplish the perfect right. wh. man required, God the Son became man, & opened in himself, a fountain for sin &c.

Burnt offer. & sacrifice for sins, could offer no hope to fallen man. Then said God the Son. "So, I come, to do" &c

From this voluntary, cheerful substitution of himself to be the sinners propitiation as early, as mans first apostacy; or the existance of human want, he is call. The Lamb slain from the foundation of the world. By this gift of himself, he

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purchased for himself, a peculiar people, who shall glo. him on earth, & become partakers of his glory in heaven. They were promised to him, in the great bo. of Redemption, which the whole foundation of a sinners hope. In them he was to "See of the travail of his soul" &c. He was to justify them, when he should bear their iniquities; & make his soul an offering for sin. He has thus bought them, with an inestimable price; & they are his people, & he is their God.

[II] God the Saviour is ours, by our voluntary acceptance of his mercy.

The rich & glorious privileges &c of the gospel, are freely offered to the enjoyment of all who hear the message which presents them. The terms of the &c. invitations are unlimited, & whosoever will, is invited by the Saviour, to be a partaker of his grace, &c.

But vast numbers despise the riches of his longsuffering, trample under foot &c. &c. But while this is the case many; there are many also.

who have received Jesus C. in their

consecration of ourselves to his service.

hearts, as their hope of glory; & have rejoiced in the acceptance of the bless. wh. he has offered them. They have felt their deep necessity for such a Saviour. They have <sup>been</sup> convinced of the wretchedness of their natural condition without him. They have found &c. without hope &c. They have been wearied with the hard service, in which they have been held; & have sought for Redemption & peace in the blood of Jesus, even the forgiveness of sins. They have thus gratefully received the offer of sal. which G. has been pleased to make to them, & have cast themselves humbly & wholly, upon him.

By this acceptance of the riches of his mercy which are in Christ Jesus, God becomes their Saviour, & their covenant God.

IV God is our God, by the personal

If we are his people, we have come out from the world, & separated ourselves from its vanities & sins. We have named ourselves by the name of our Lord J. C., & have bound ourselves in love with him, to be his forever, & to depart from iniquity. We are not our own &c. we have no right to live unto ourselves.

He has seal'd us with his Holy spirit unto the day of redemption; & we have promised to live in remembrance, that our time, our talents, our opportunities & power to do good, are all the Lord's. &c.

There has been a sol. agreement record ed in heaven, between every Christian & that Saviour, whom we are bound to serve: An agreement voluntarily entered into by themselves; that they will have no other god but him, that every idl shall be relinquished, & cast away:

that their whole affections shall be<sup>4</sup>  
consecrated unto him, & to his glory for  
ever.

This dedication of ourselves to God,  
is recognised in all our approaches to  
his throne of grace, public or private.

We come unto him as our God: God  
to whom we have made the voluntary  
gift of ourselves, to be a living sacrifice  
unto him, & whose promises established  
in the S. S. C. we have <sup>the</sup> right therefore to  
plead before him.

We have <sup>thus</sup> avouched the Lord to be our  
God; & we shall be witnesses against  
ourselves, if we forsake his service,  
& yield our affections to any other.
