## COAL STOVE INVENTED BY LANCASTER MAN

T HE Lancaster Journal of Friday, March 26th, 1830, contained a news item, under the heading, "Saving of Fuel," which was as follows:

"Mr. Benedict of this city, has obtained a patent for a coal stove, answering all the uses and purposes of the common ten plate stove in a family. We understand that one of these stoves in constant use, as well in cooking as in warming a room during the last winter, has not consumed quite a ton of coal; and that a ten plate stove formerly in the same situation, and used for the same purposes, consumed from three to four cords of wood in the same space of time. Besides the great advantages resulting from the saving in the cost of fuel, and security from accident, there is yet another of some importance to the man of taste: The victuals cooked in one of these stoves, are free from the disagreeably smoky taste which they acquire when done in a stove heated by a wood fire."

It is to be regretted that we do not have information relative to Mr. Benedict,—who he was, in what part of the city he resided, and his occupation.
