The Mathiot Family of Lancaster County

One may wonder why a family named Mathiot is significant enough to merit research beyond the private confines of genealogy. Although the Mathiot family is observing its two hundredth anniversary in America and Lancaster County this year (1954), fewer persons in Lancaster County bear that surname at present than at the time of the American revolution.

Social historians recognize among the more prominent families a more or less distinctive connection caused by intermarriage. Usually these families are joined directly to each other. In Lancaster the families of Atlee, Barber, Carpenter, Hager, Bolenius, Eberman, Wisler, Wike, Weaver and others are not joined with obvious directness; nevertheless, they are related through the medium of one family - the Mathiot family.

Huguenot Background

When the Edict of Nantes was revoked in 1685, French Protestants, called Huguenots, began fleeing France, and together with the German Palatines, came to America after a short stay in the Palatinate. Among these Huguenots were Jean Mathiot, his wife, Margaret Catherine, and his young brother, Georges Mathiot. 1 Jean and Georges were sons of Marcus and Jane Bautonet-Piraulomb Mathiot. Their ancestor, Jean Mathiot, according to family tradition, was an officer in the French army during the massacre of St. Bartholomew. Another ancestor, a Charles Mathiot, was supposed to have been an officer at the court of the Bourbons. Margaret Catharine Mathiot was the daughter of the Honorable Jean Jacques Bernard, mayor of Dampierre-of-the-forest, in Doubs, and his wife, Annie Marie Cuenot, both French patricians.

Margaret Catherine Bernard was born November 26, 1730, and on May 13, 1753, she was married to Jean Mathiot at Montbeliard, France. following year they left France and arrived in Philadelphia via Rotterdam on the ship Nancy, Captain John Ewing master, on September 14, 1754.2

Coming to Lancaster County immediately, the Mathiots settled in Lamneter Township, and at once became identified with Trinity Lutheran Church in Lancaster. On March 29, 1763, Georges Mathiot married Lucia Holder.³



learned the trade of tailoring, and in 1785 he established his home and shop on lot #595, on the southeast corner of East King and Jefferson Streets in Lancaster. In 1792 he sold the eastern half of the lot to Christopher Hager, and in 1796 he sold the remainder to Philip A. Peticolas, a miniature painter. Removing

to Columbia, he erected a brick house in 1797. He and Michael Gundaker opened a dry goods and grocery store. An unusual feature of the store was its lumber department in which white and yellow pine boards, and bedpost scantling were sold. According to the Lancaster Daily Express, April 19, 1873, "They [Mathiot and Gundaker] were the first and only persons who . . . sold lumber of that description . . . as early as 1800. The boards were yellow pine from Juniata and Dauphin counties." The same newspaper account describes the accidental death of John Mathiot: "Mr. Mathiot, while hunting upon one of the islands — Mifflin Island — below the dam, was accidently shot by a friend who mistook him for a muskrat, he having taken off his hat and laid down in some bushes — the hair of his head was only seen." John Mathiot's estate was sufficient to maintain his widow and eight living children in comfort. They had ten children:

A study of these children and their progeny will reveal a subtle social pattern.

B. John Mathiot, born December 26, 1784. He married Mary Gonter. In 1807, President Jefferson appointed him postmaster of Columbia, which office he held until he was elected sheriff of Lancaster County in 1819. Although Mathiot was a Republican,

he was supported by the Federalists of the county. His entire career was in public affairs; he was a scrivener, and for many years was clerk of the select council of Lancaster, and was in 1831 elected mayor. He was re-elected to that office eleven times.

1831 elected mayor. He was re-elected to that office eleven times. He became the third president of the Lancaster School Board in May 1839, and served up to his death in 1843. He was a stockholder in the Columbia School in 1807; and was a member

of the Columbia Presbyterian Church and the Columbia Fire

Company in 1814. He marched to Kennett Square with Captain Jacob Strickler's Company in the War of 1812; since their services were not required they returned. John Mathiot was a member of the Union Fire Company, No. 1. He was a Past Master of Lodge 43, Free and Accepted Masons. He died January 22, 1843.¹¹ John and Mary Gonter Mathiot had three children:

Amos Ellmaker, equally famed in the Bar and political affairs of Lancaster. William Mathiot read law with the latter, and was admitted to the Bar in 1841. He was a member of the Democratic Committee of Correspondence in 1843, and when Zachary Taylor visited Lancaster William Mathiot made the address of welcome. From April 1845 to April 1848, he served as deputy attorney general. Mathiot was an honored member of the Old Residents' Society of Columbia which consisted of thirty-two quality gentlemen of more than fifty years' residence in Columbia. William Mathiot was a shareholder in the Columbia Library Company in
