Collections of Eichholtz Paintings

To those Lancastrians who minimize the status of Jacob Eichholtz as an outstanding American portraitist, it may come as a surprise to be told that in the collections of the National Gallery of Art in Washington there are eleven portraits by Jacob Eichholtz, Lancaster's most famous artist of all time.

Recently I visited the National Gallery and saw these three Eichholtz portraits: "James F. Smith," Mellon Collection; "The Ragan Sisters," presented by Mrs. Cooper Drewry; "William Clark Frazer," Mellon Collection.

After I returned home, I wrote to the curator, inquiring if possibly the Gallery may own additional portraits by Eichholtz. The letter which I received and which here follows gives the interesting information that the National Gallery does indeed possess eight Eichholtz items which are presently not on display.
