## A SHORT PREFACE TO A COPY OF A MEMORANDUM OF JACOB EICHOLTZ. THE ARTIST.

So much has been written of Jacob Eicholtz born soon after the Declaration of Independence that it is not my purpose to go into details, his struggle to succeed in his art, how near we came to losing him, and because of the inadequate support received here, he removed to Philadelphia for ten years but came back again so that we may, indeed, call him our own, in history.

His struggle for the art he loved, really began at thirty. He came in contact with Sully who gave him some of his own used brushes and with a boot jack for a palette he worked at his beloved art that he might attain the end that he desired, and the remainder of the time worked as a coppersmith and painted hotel signs that he might support the family he loved, for he had married a widow with two children and had started to raise a family of his own.

About this time he met a Mr. Barton, of Philadelphia, who urged him to go to Boston to see Gilbert Stewart and was encouraged by him and continued working and achieving from then on.

Only recently, I have found the original account book of Jacob Eicholtz in his old home and the home of his son, Robert Eicholtz, at 46 South Lime Street, a calf bound book, about 3x6 inches and containing the names of some of his customers, now in the possession of his granddaughter, Miss Ziegler, living in the old home.

His first portrait was of a Philadelphian, Nicholas Biddle, and at his death there was an unfinished portrait of Dr. Barton, a Philadelphian, and it remained in the possession of his son, Robert, the head only was finished

and the body not painted.

It remained thus until one day, Mrs. Eicholtz read in the "Philadelphia Public Ledger" thas Mrs. Willing, of 522 South Broad Street, had entertained a number of distinguished guests, and Mrs. Eicholtz said to her daughter, "suppore you write to Mrs. Willing and ask her if she would like to have the portrait of her father?" The letter was written and a reply received stating Mrs. Willing already had four portraits of her father but if the Eicholtz one was good she would like to possess it and would Mr. Eicholtz express it for her inspection as she was not able to come to Lancaster. Mr. Eicholtz conformed with this request and in a few days received a letter saying the portrait was received safely. Mrs. Willing was very much delighted, as the portrait was by far handsomer than any she had.

Mrs. Willing who was the mother of Miss Ava Willing, who married John Jacob Astor, returned a check for one hundred dollars, a price the artist never had asked for his portrait. Thirty dollars was his price and when family groups or two portraits of a family were painted, they were reduced.

How vastly different from the prices of present day artists.

An interesting term in the memorandum is the term "Kit Kat" a term used by a club formed in 1740 in England and applied to portraits only three-

used by a club formed in 1740 in England and applied to portraits only threefourths the size of the usual portrait size.

It was my good fortune to see the Eicholtz portraits at what was considered a wonderful exposition of "The Evolution of Portraiture" in Lancaster

County, Pennsylvania, under the auspices of the Lancaster Historical Society and the Iris Club in the Woolworth Building, Lancaster, Pa., November 2nd, 1912, and I was particularly interested in a certain portrait, something different, a certain quality, only explained in one way I thought, and to make sure I retraced my steps several times examining all the Eicholtz portraits and com-

paring them with the one in question, it was the portrait of Judg then I felt convinced my first impression was correct.
