## OLD TIME POLITICAL TOASTS.

At a Clay meeting, held in a woods along the Maytown road, now owned by A. Hiestand, near Marietta, in the year 1836, my father, Alex. L. Evans, was appointed to write regular toasts. They express the bitterness of political parties at that time. I was present at the meeting, but cannot recall the exact date. I had a jolly time, with other boys, in the woods.—Samuel Evans.

## The Toasts.

The following were the toasts:

- "1. The Day We Celebrate—Sacred to the cause of Freedom, and an especially appropriate occasion to rebuke the vaulting ambition of those servants of the people high in office who aspire to become their masters.
- "2. The Memory of the Only Washington—It remains fresh and unrivalled in the hearts of his countrymen. 'Expressive silence, muse his praise.'
- "3. Lafayette—The apostle of liberty in two hemispheres and her consistent advocate in three revolutions. While the mountains of our country stand and her rivers continue to flow, his name will be borne on the applauding breath of her grateful citizens.
- "4. The Present Administration—A sink of the vilest iniquity, rotten to the core, supported by the lavish waste of the public funds in buying satellites and praised only by those who are paid for their subserviency. An indignant people, jealous of their liberties, will prostrate it in the dust.

"5. The Senate of the United States—A band of incorruptible patriots—worthy descendants of the Whigs of '76—they have stood firm in the breach broken by an usurping executive in the constitution of the country and have stayed the progress of

faithful servants' of the people.

"6. The Patriots of the Revolution—
They have gone to their rest and are looking down from their seats in eternity upon the land which they bled to emancipate. Will their chil-

bled to emancipate. Will their children permit them to behold the painful spectacle of those institutions which they established becoming the prey of venal panders to an unprincipled lust of power and of the vile spirit of man-worship?

"7. Martin Van Buren—A political

Fox whom a sagacious people will track in spite of all his doublings to his den and bag him at the polls.

"8. The General Postoffice—Prostituted to the vilest purposes of bribery and corruption; expending the public funds in purchasing supporters and rewarding favorites with extra allowances; buying up the press with newspaper privileges and mail contracts; interfering in elections by the

its employment and pays with the people's money. It is now bankrupt in consequence of its effort to reduce freemen to the base attitude of cowering slaves.

"9. Pennsylvania—Her voice is the voice of honesty and speaks with authority in the public councils. She
