bake house in Heidelberg township, Lebanon county, several weeks ago, on property once owned by Leonard Holstoner. The house to which it was attached is a very old one, having been built during the first half of the eighte-nth

century. It has lately been modernized, until much of its once venerable appearance has been lost. No doubt the bake-oven was also built prior to 1750, but of that there is no evidence, save that in those days all the bread was baked at home and that bake-

ovens were in consequence as much of a necessity as the dwellings themselves. But during the past fall the oven was torn down, and, as I happened along soon afterward, I secured one of the tiles with which the bake house or oven was covered. Tiled roofs, like thatched ones, are things of the past.

thatched ones, are things of the past. Once they were quite common, but it is rare to see one of either kind at the present day.

Leonard Holstoner, or, as it is now written, Holstein, was one of the early settlers on the famous Muhlbach creek, in Lebanon county, where he died in 1757. He is said to have been a person of no little influence and importance in that locality in his day and generation, and is credited with
